From the Pastor's Desk

EXTRAORDINARY WOMEN OF THE BIBLE SUMMER REFLECTION SERIES XIII: LYDIA: Prepared with Purple

My dear parish family:

I hope you have found this reflection series helpful in your summer spiritual journey. There are dozens more extraordinary women to found in the pages of sacred scripture. Maybe next summer we can meet more. Stay tuned!



In her article "Cameos: The Women of the New Testament," author Ann Madsen says this about Lydia, "A seller of purple, she may have been named Lydia because she came from Thyatira, a city in the district of Lydia in Asia Minor that was famous for its exports of purple due, a highly prized item during this period. An inscription discovered in the ruins in Thyatira commemorates the Dyers' Guild. Perhaps Lydia had learned the proper use of purple dye as a member of that very guild."

Her home was most likely used as the meeting place for the Church in Phillipi and perhaps Paul had Lydia in mind when later in his letter addressed to his friends, the Philippians, he writes, I thank my God upon every remembrance of you. Always in

every prayer of mine for you making request with joy, for your fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now." Lydia was probably a very "well-to-do" woman, seeing as the author of the Acts of the Apostles (most scholars say it's Luke) identifies by her trade as a "seller of purple" and that she has a "household." It may be that she was unmarried or a widow seeing as there is no mention of her husband.

The thing that stands out the most about Lydia's story is how she had been prepared, long before Paul arrived at Phillipi, to hear and accept the gospel of Jesus Christ. The scriptures tell us that she "worshiped God" even before her conversion and that the Lord had opened her heart. She was a seeker of truth and had prepared her heart and mind to receive it. In fact we can't help but wonder if it was her prayers and her desire for the truth that prompted the Lord to send Paul a vision of " a man in Macedonia... saying, Come over into Macedonia, and help us." Even though the messenger of this vision was a man, it is very likely that Paul's appearance in Phillipi was in direct answer to Lydia's prayers; especially seeing how quickly and readily she accepts the gospel. Yes, Lydia had already made room in her heart and in her home for God and His messengers.

There is a great lesson to be learned from Lydia's example. She teaches us the value of cultivating our faith and having an inquiring mind and an open heart. She also shows us how being in the right place and being surrounded by the good people helps us be in the right place at the right time to hear God's messages. Her story also makes us ponder if we have made "room" in our hearts and in our homes for God's word. Like Lydia, are we quick to recognize God's truth and welcome it into our home and our life? Alternatively, do we wait for a huge tragedy, like the earthquake that converted Paul's prison keeper or some devastatingly horrible world event like war, before we are willing to accept God's message?

Finally, Lydia's story shows us the value of each soul to God and His willingness to answer our prayers. Lydia's prayers were probably one of the reasons Paul felt called to travel to Phillipi. Lydia's soul was precious to God and her worth great in His eyes. The Lord heard the deepest desires of her heart and answered them, probably in ways greater than she ever imagined. Her story is a beautiful testament of God's love for His children, especially His daughters, and the degree to which He is willing to go to save just one soul and bring truth to just one of His children who are ready and willing to hear truth.

Have we made room in our homes (not just at the four walled structures we bustle around in, but the home of our hearts – or more profound the home of our eternal souls), like Lydia did, for God come to us? If not. If our homes are too cluttered and messy, what changes can we make in our lives and in our hearts to give them room for God?
