

## CHILD PROTECTION AND CREATING SAFE ENVIRONMENTS-

**BULLYING** is defined as any unwanted aggressive behavior by another youth or group of youths that involves an observed or perceived power imbalance and is repeated multiple times or is highly likely to be repeated. 20% of youth ages 12-18 experience bullying. When adults respond quickly to bullying behavior, they send the message that bullying is not acceptable. There are ways parents can make a positive difference. Parents can educate themselves on the signs that a child is being bullied or is a bully. Parents should keep the lines of communication open with their child and model for their child how to treat others. Encourage your child to be inclusive by welcoming others to join their activities and groups. ## From the Pastor's Desk

My dear parish family:


The year was 1951. Pope Pius XII decreed that the southeastern portion of the Diocese of Pittsburgh should be separated and the Diocese of Greensburg was born. That same day the first bishop was named. The Most Reverend Hugh Louis Lamb, the Auxiliary Bishop of Philadelphia. Within a few days the Archbishop of Philadelphia, Cardinal Denis Dougherty, died and Bishop Lamb was named Administrator of the archdiocese. Bishop Lamb deep down, many surmised, didn't want to go to Greensburg, wishing perhaps that the Vatican would forget since he was now administering his home diocese. The priests of the new diocese of Greensburg waited and they waited and they waited some more. They were a new Church without a shepherd, waiting for direction. As the legend goes, the priests got together and penned a letter to the bishop designate. It contained all their names below one sentence – a question actually: "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" Scripture obviously inspires! And the Word of God should also offer us inspiration on this Third Sunday of Advent – Gaudete Sunday – the Sunday of Rejoicing.

Those priests in Greensburg exemplified a typical human trait, that many us, myself included, share – frustration with waiting. Waiting is not usually the top ten on anyone's list. In the instantaneous society we live in today we can point and click and purchase practically anything, replete with overnight shipping. With a simple swipe of our smart phones we can talk with anyone in the world in a matter of seconds. When we want an answer we expect it immediately, with no obstacles, no detours, and no waiting! God forbid if anyone gets in our way – even if it may be God Himself!

Moreover, the scriptures are obvious guides for us. The apostle James in our second reading this weekend puts it succinctly: "Be patient, brothers and sisters, until the coming of the Lord. See how the farmer waits for the precious fruit of the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains. You too must be patient. Make your hearts firm, because the coming of the Lord is at hand." Yes, the Lord is coming again. Once again the light of Bethlehem will dispel the darkness of the world. Soon – very soon the Child of Joy – the King of Kings – the One who will save all humanity will be in our midst. We – the entire human family – need Him to come again at Christmas. We need to make room in our hearts to welcome him again. We must echo the words of the ancient psalmist, that were echoed throughout churches, chapels, and cathedrals through the world with us this weekend, as we enter into these remaining days of Advent, "Lord, come and save us."

Why then is our world and our society still looking for another? Why is there still this terrible blindness in recognizing that Jesus Christ's face is part of our faces – that the Lord's beauty is part of the beauty of every single human being? Why are people still deaf to the cries of the poor, the oppressed, the marginalized, the wounded, and the forgotten of society? The Lord comes again soon to set prisoners free! And many of us are indeed imprisoned; not behind iron bars in the county jail, but we often lock ourselves away in loneliness, sorrow, pain – we isolate ourselves from family, friends, the Church – from the healing, forgiving and life-giving hands of Jesus Christ.

Pope Benedict XVI once remarked: "The coming of Christ marks the fullness of time. If He had come at the beginning of time, He would have been too early. If his coming had been delayed until the end of time, He would come too late." When God is ready He will enter into our lives at the right time – at the right place



– and change us for the better. That's what we wait for on December 25<sup>th</sup>. The Savior will be right on time – exactly when and where He promised! What about us? Will we make time to rejoice – today on this rose-colored Third Sunday of Advent – on Christmas Day – and every day that God gives us that follows? Yes, sisters and brothers, we must make room – be prepared – and be patient for the joy that only Christ can bring us.

As St. Paul reminds us, Father Justin "Rejoice! I say it again, rejoice!"
