

From the Pastor's Desk

My dear parish family:

This year many of the most beautiful feasts in the Church's calendar happen to fall on Sunday. This weekend is such a feast – The Exaltation (or Triumph) of the Holy Cross, which happens to coincide also this year with our Holy Father Pope Leo XIV's 70th birthday!



The Cross of Jesus Christ. So often we focus on the Cross primarily during Lent, especially on Good Friday when we approach it and kiss it reverently. The rest of year we still see it in church, but usually focus on another aspect of the season whether it's Christmas or Easter or Ordinary Time. The cross becomes "ordinary" to us. It's off-center or hidden. Today we see it front and center. So too are those fourteen steps we call the Stations of the Cross or the Way of the Cross. They are vivid and alive during Lent; on Good Friday they are full of color – especially the blood red pouring from the hands, feet, head and side of Jesus; yet the rest of year they fade into the background, the colors become muted and we walk by them with an "ordinary" stroll.

Today reminds us that the Cross – the triumph of Jesus over sin – the Lord's victory over death – is not on the back burner of our faith – the Cross is not

off center or blending into the woodwork – the Cross is the epicenter, the climax, the heart of our Catholic Christian experience every day. Not just during Lent is the way of Cross, our way, our path, our road to eternal life. We don't walk the stations with Jesus just once a year, but every day. Every day, because when we trust and love our God, we wake up and go out into the world and walk these fourteen steps.

Sometimes we are condemned like Jesus and often we condemn others. Each morning we pick up our Cross, whatever the size of weight. We encounter people along the way just like Jesus – maybe it's our mother or family – some stranger like Simon to help us carry our cross or we offer to carry someone else's – a woman like Veronica may need to wipe away our blood, sweat and tears like she did for Jesus. There are those days when fall under the weight of the Cross – maybe once or twice or three like Jesus, or maybe more! We often feel embarrassed and unguarded like the Lord when he was stripped of his dignity and garments. There are moments on our roads that our hands and feet and held against our wills and someone with savage hatred, nails us to the wood that once hung the Savior of the world and the hurt and agony – the pain and suffering is so overwhelming.

Then there comes those moments of death – dying to ourselves – dying to others – sacrificing all those things that divide and separate us from God, so that we might love Him even more – our neighbors more – ourselves more. Jesus tells us in John's gospel what He must do and what we must do to imitate Him. The Lord says: "So must the Son of Man be <u>lifted up</u>, so that everyone who <u>believes</u> in Him may have <u>eternal life</u>." Do you believe? Do I? Do we want eternal life? Of course! Then all of us must be <u>lifted up</u> to the Cross with the God who became one of us out of extraordinary love, to save the human race.

Then like in the last two stations, after be lifted, we will be taken down and be given rest. But do the stations end there in that cold tomb? No. The Way of the Cross continues here – here at this Table of the Word, where Jesus is alive and speaks to us every day. The stations guide us here to this other Table of Sacrament, where Christ is alive in the bread and wine that will become for us His Body and Blood. The Wounded, Crucified, Risen and Ascended Jesus is here within us, because of the Cross. No wonder we say **exult**!

Let's be sure not to push the Cross into a corner out of the center of our lives. Let's not allow the way of the cross to fade away until next Lent, but walk them with Jesus every day. By walking with Jesus along this path, with His Cross – with our cross upon our shoulders, we can become closer to eternal life, where the love of Christ – that same love that even the horror of the Cross could not destroy, will never end.

When we make the Sign of Cross today before we leave mass – don't leave the Cross here, but let it trace over our whole bodies – inside upon our hearts and take it with us. Hold on to the Cross, but most of all, live out it's love! "We adore you, O Christ, and we bless You, because by Your Cross you have redeemed the world!" That wasn't just true 2,000 years ago on Calvary's hill, its true today – it's true right here!

Today and always may God bless you and keep you!
